PHVX12A - Headshot Portrait Tips

1. Framing - How is headshot subject framed?

Should be relatively tight on the head Can be vertical or horizontal frame Can come in very close or include head, shoulders, part of torso Background should be clean. No distractions. Environment is not important

2. Shooting Angles - Where to position the camera and subject?

Try to create some interesting angles Shoot from above or below Generally shoot from a little distance and use telephoto to flatten facial features Create angles by posing subject at different angles, putting hips and shoulders at angles

3. Lighting - What kind of lighting is best for headshots?

Avoid harsh lighting and deep shadows for most portraits or headshots Look for diffused lighting Skylight but not direct sunlight

Window light

Diffuser or soft box on studio lights

Watch out for color temperature of light

Avoid greenish florescent light in portraits

Compensate for blue of sky light in shady areas

Look for warmer light tones on skin

Try to create volume on face with light and shadow

4. Posing Subject - What kinds of poses work best for headshot portraits?

Avoid straight on mugshot style headshot. Too dull. Angle hips and shoulders to one side or another Lean body forward, straight up and back Turn head to left, center and right Angle chin up, level and down Tilt head left, straight up and right Try many combinations of these posing variables to get effective results

5. Expression - How can I get the best expressions for headshots?

Establish rapport and agreement on purpose of shoot with subject Try to elicit a variety of expressions Focus on the eyes - direct the subject's gaze to camera, down, up, etc.
